

AP U.S. Government & Politics

Themes of the Course

This is a one-year course that will stress the following:

Students will analyze and interpret data on a variety of subjects including

- Constitutional Underpinnings of United States Government
- Political Beliefs and Political Behaviors
- Political Parties, Interest Groups, and Mass Media
- Institutions of National Government
- Public Policy
- Civil Rights and Civil Liberties

The students will write an in class essay every two weeks. These free response essays will be used in conjunction with lecture notes, PowerPoint presentations, role playing and discussion groups in order to analyze and interpret the role of government on American society.

In this class, you will develop a more sophisticated understanding of majority-rule democracy, constitutionalism, and civil liberties. You will be able to perceive relationships and distinctions in and among the institutions and public policies of those who govern.

Guidelines

Attendance is extremely important, as the class will move quickly.

Homework will be given nightly, and it is an expectation that all assignments are turned in on time.

In order to be successful in this class, it is important for each student to read various periodicals including The Wall Street Journal, The New York Times and various news magazines. These are located in the school library. There will be newspaper assignments weekly. These will apply that week's chapter to a current event piece. All students must dedicate time to watch the BBC news each night on our local cable channel. There will be numerous class discussions and activities that will refer to these media resources.
